The Role

We are seeking three research assistants to support the ongoing community history project <u>'A Muslim History of Oxford'</u>. The roles are supported by a partnership between the Everyday Muslim Heritage and Archive Initiative (EMHAI) and the University of Oxford's Faculty of History.

In November 2020, the History Faculty began the work of growing a new 'community history' initiative: to strengthen the Faculty's relationships with local historians and community groups throughout Oxford and Oxfordshire, and to enhance its work in the field of local and community history. The new initiative is grounded in an ethos of putting ethical, equitable working relationships at the heart of these endeavours to engage more deeply with community history research and public engagement, and particularly to create more space for local historians and community groups to set these ongoing agendas.

'A Muslim History of Oxford' aims to create an archive collection of oral history interviews and other materials. The collection will reflect the long history of Muslims in Oxford, from the earliest members who arrived as students and scholars in the 19th century, to growing communities in places like East Oxford, where labourers from the Commonwealth often settled from the mid-20th century onward. The collection will also represent the varying facets of Oxford's Muslim history, including notable individuals, organisations, important buildings and key events. This collection will then be used to create academic and public engagement outputs, such as a Muslim history trail in Oxford which is currently being developed.

The Research Assistants will be an integral part of the project team, and their input will be crucial in shaping the project's outputs. They will collect and document the experiences of the Muslim community in Oxford, past and present. This will primarily be achieved through the collection and analysis of













archival research and oral history interviews. They will also support the planning and execution of focus groups with Oxford's Muslim community, as well as a workshop on community history and oral history methodology. This is with a view of widening our network within the community, as well as exploring and engaging with the diversity of Oxford's Muslim community.

Responsibilities

- To independently collect, review and analyse archival materials from identified collections, including institutional and private collections.
- To identify new archival collections related to Oxford's migrant and Muslim history.
- To review existing scholarship on the Muslim and migrant histories of Oxford and Britain, as part of a broader effort to be in conversation with existing and ongoing local and national research
- To identify and build a rapport with potential interviewees, as well as summarise and analyse
 oral history interviews. There may be opportunities to conduct your own oral history interviews,
 depending on workload.
- To support the planning and execution of two workshops with the Muslim community in Oxford and an oral history workshop with local students and adult learners.
- To support the development of a Muslim history trail which reflects the outcomes of the community workshops, archival research, oral histories and secondary reading.

Selection criteria

Essential selection criteria

- A completed honours degree or equivalent experience.
- Attention to detail and highly literate able to read and comprehend a variety of historical source material.
- The ability and willingness to learn quickly, assimilate complex information and to provide accurate and coherent information when required.
- Good interpersonal skills to develop effective and collaborative working relationships with other research assistants, archivists, librarians, and staff at the History Faculty.
- Ability to work independently and flexibly in managing own research and administrative activities.
- Strong organisational ability, able to work to set deadlines.
- Be flexible and able to work in dynamic and new environments (including archives, libraries and museums).

Desirable selection criteria

- Experience of working in a research team and contributing ideas for new research projects.
- Experience of conducting and/or analysing oral history interviews.
- An interest in the history of Oxford and Oxfordshire.
- An interest in the Muslim history of Oxford and the Muslim history of Britain.

Faculty of History
